The return of the Deadly Dames: Forgotten female detectives

For the past ten years, the Deadly Dames have been a panel of five crime fiction authors who, along with guest Dames and Chevaliers, have provided lively, humorous but insightful discussions into many aspects of their genre. Sadly, in the last few years, through death or frail health, three of the Dames have left us. Undaunted, the remaining Dames, Charlie Cochrane and Carol Westron, have arranged to be part of BookFest with a new Zoom panel and have invited two guest Dames to join them to discuss Forgotten Female Detectives. The talk promises to be wide-ranging and will include a prim ex-governess with a passion for quoting Lord Tennyson, a lip-reading detective, and a sharp-tongued, soft-hearted, American whose attempts to thwart villains results in some ludicrous and dangerous situations.

Speakers:



Carol Westron is an expert on the Golden Age of Detective Fiction and the organiser of Mystery Fest. She is the author of several contemporary crime novels and a Victorian Murder Mystery all set in the

south of England. Her most recent novel is a comedy/cosy crime story, *The Curse of the Concrete Griffi*n.



Charlie Cochrane writes gay fiction, both mysteries and romance. Her three mystery series range from the Edwardian-era Cambridge Fellows series, the Alasdair and Toby mysteries set post – World War 2,

and the contemporary Lindenshaw Mysteries. Charlie's most recent Cambridge Fellows novella is *Lessons in Keeping a Dangerous Promise*.



M.K. Graff is an award-winning American author who loves Britain, which is the setting for her series featuring Nora Tierney, an American children's book author now living in England. In contrast,

Marni's other series features Trudy Genova, a New York nurse who works as medical advisor for a film studio; this concept is based on Marni's own nursing job when based in New York and was suggested by her mentor, P.D. James. The most recently published Nora Tierney novel is *The Evening's Amethyst*.



J.L. Merrow writes contemporary gay romance and mysteries, and is frequently accused of humour. Two of her novels have won Rainbow Awards for Romantic Comedy (*Slam!*, 2013 and *Spun!*, 2017)

and several of her books have been EPIC Awards finalists, including *Relief Valve* (*Plumber's Mate Mystery 2*.)



Christopher Somerville: The View from the Hill

In my workroom is a case of shelves that holds 450 notebooks. Their pages are creased and stained with mud, blood, flattened insect corpses, beer glass rings, smears of plant juice and gallons of sweat. Everything I've written about walking the British countryside has had its origin among these little black-and-red books.

During the enforced idleness of the Covid-19 pandemic, when I couldn't travel anywhere to research more walks, I revisited these 450 notebooks. *The View from the Hill* pulls together the best from their pages, following the cycle of the seasons from a freezing January to a Christmas sunrise. In between are hundreds of walks that take in magnificent flora and fauna, ancient traditions and folklore, geological peculiarities and wonders, and lots of humour.'

There's no need to travel far if you'd like to go walking in Christopher's company. Just come along to his talk and let yourself be spirited away.

Julia Margaret Cameron, photographer: a talk by Kirsty Stonell – Walker

Julia Margaret Cameron (1815 – 1879) received her first camera as a gift when she was forty-eight but her love affair with the medium had already spanned several decades and continents.

An enthusiast for this newly-invented device, she travelled the world befriending experts who taught her the magic and the science of the lens such as the astronomer John Herschel, and pioneering photographers like her brother-in-law the Earl Somers and the Swedish risk-taking artist Oscar Rejlander.

Through her brief career as a professional photographer, Cameron broke boundaries with her new medium and created art works that still electrify and dazzle today. Come and find out more about this pioneering photographer with art historian Kirsty Stonell – Walker, author of *Pre – Raphaelite Girl Gang* (Unicorn Publishing 2018) and *Light and Love* (Unicorn Publishing 2020).

Join Alan Smith for this storytime all about the pebble people on Southsea beach! The story is suitable for ages 6–8 years but some younger and older children


may enjoy it too.





A life in Music journalism with Martin James

Originally published in 1997, State of Bass: *The Origins of Jungle and Drum & Bass* explores the scene's roots through its social, cultural and musical antecedents. Drawing on interviews with some of the key figures in the early years, the book explores the sonic shifts and splinters of new variants, styles and subgenres as it charts the journey from the early days as the deliberately hidden underground to its position as a global phenomenon. The Velocity Press reissue extends the original text to include the award of the Mercury Prize to Roni Size & Reprazent and brings new perspectives to the story of the UK's most important subterranean urban energy.

State of Bass author Martin James has written several other books about urban and electronic music and culture including French Connections: from discotheque to discovery, an account of the emergence of the late 90s French Touch scene and We Eat Rhythm, the definitive biography of The Prodigy. Martin is now Professor of Creative and Cultural Industries at Solent University, Southampton where he lectures on underground music and the music industry. Martin James will be in conversation with Colin Steven of Velocity Press, the publisher of State of Bass.

Transmedia storytelling for writers with far too much imagination!

A practical, collaborative workshop for writers interested in exploring new and emerging forms of storytelling, facilitated by story consultant Alison Norrington. This writer's room experience will take you from idea to outline as your ideas come alive and you pour your imagination onto the page.

The workshop is the first step in a journey which will culminate with a large-scale immersive audio-visual arts installation in Portsmouth Cathedral in November 2022. We invite writers with too much imagination to bring their pens, notebooks, and creativity and pour it on to the page.

This collaborative, hands on, practical workshop will be facilitated by Story Consultant Alison Norrington who is an expert in transmedia storytelling.

Not too sure what transmedia is? Well don't worry all will become clear during the workshop as Alison guides you through the process of adapting and ideating for transmedia.

The starting point for the workshop will be a slim volume of poems by Becci Louise entitled *Octopus Medicine*. The three stories in the volume tell of an octopus who dreams of stars, a self-important fisherman who gets what's coming to him, and a misunderstood monster.

We challenge you to turn the ideas, themes, and characters in this series of watery adventures into an original outline for our new ACE funded project Octopuses & other Sea Creatures. One we can hand on to the actors, artists and creators who will bring your ideas to life as part of the We Shine – Portsmouth festival of light in November 2022.

Home and Away: Portsmouth as inspiration for exploring the world with Celia Clark

Celia and Historic Buildings Architect Deane Clark, inspired by living in Portsmouth for 50 years, explore cities, forts and dockyards in many parts of the world, photographing, writing books, articles and poetry.

In 1982 Celia was the first secretary of the Portsmouth Royal Dockyard Historical Society, founded to save documents, artefacts and equipment used by dockyard workers over the centuries. Her recordings of skilled dockyard tradespeople are in the Portsmouth History Centre and her lecture 'Drilling hammock Hooks for Sailors: women workers in Dockyards in WWI' was part of the Portsmouth Festival in 2014. The research on which it based was published in the Naval Dockyards Society's Transactions.

Celia's passion for Brutalist architecture inspired her book *The Tricorn. Life and Death of a Sixties Icon* which celebrates the bold, multi-layered and multi-use architectural icon built in Portsmouth from 1962 to 1966, demolished in 2004.

Her most recent book with Martin Marks OBE: *Barracks, Forts and Ramparts: Regeneration Challenges for Portsmouth Harbour's Defence Heritage* explores transformation to new civilian life in Gunwharf, Haslar Hospital, the Diving Museum, Royal Clarence Yard and the Naval Base Heritage Area.


